

Rev. Peter Harold Roe

As we reported in the last edition of The Moat, Rev. Peter Roe, former vicar of St. Mary's, sadly passed away at the age of 82 following a battle with cancer on 11th June 2020. Peter was vicar at St. Mary's from 1973 until 1990 and many members of St. Mary's, both past and present, have requested to share some of their memories of him, so here are some of the messages that we have received, along with comments from out Facebook page:



Rev. Peter Roe

Peter Roe succeeded Rev. Raymond Ross, and came here with his wife Butty and his daughters Fran and Jo. He was a devoted minister delivering inspirational sermons, and giving unstinted help to all people on their own personal problems. He introduced us to having annual PCC residential courses, missions, etc. He enjoyed our social activities, and at one time abseiled down a wall at a summer fayre to raise funds for the church, and played the part of Thomas Becket in the Moat Players' production of "Becket" in the church. We have many happy memories of his time with us, and send our love to his family.

Born in Humility

Peter Roe was not the sort of vicar to stand at the door every Sunday morning and to ask after the wellbeing of the family. For this he was sometimes criticised. Few people knew how deep were his Christian roots. His work with the Samaritans was tremendous but one of the oaths of Samaritans is to keep one's membership quiet. When my life was stressful i.e. when I tried to bring up three little boys instead of playing the bass guitar, I would pop to the vicarage to be supported by Peter and Butty and when my son Felix died, Peter became my rock. God bless him.

To many, Peter was somewhat of an enigma as he could appear to be rather distant. Peter was not interested in idle chatter or gossip and felt that people should not be going to church because of loyalty to the "Vicar" but should be attending as part of their Christian ministry. His command of the English language was second to none and his sermons and the written word were beyond reproach. His wry sense of humour was enjoyed by many in his annual Christmas letter which he wrote after he moved away. During his time at St. Mary's he went on a "Church Course" at Windsor where one of the exercises was to read a section of a book and then reduce the essence of each page to one line, then to reduce each sentence to one word and then one word for the lot. The object of the exercise was to focus on the message without any clutter.

One of my first recollections of Peter was when he took the lead role in a play about Becket within St Mary's Church. It was a most gripping performance. Later on, much to my surprise, he asked me to be his Churchwarden, a position I held for 12 years which remains a period with many memories. During this time, he was a regular visitor to the 3rd Solihull St. Mary's Scout Camp and he could be relied upon to write a humorous account of his visit. One in particular was to the Dan yr Ogof Caves where the young Guide was continually reminding us that everything was "by courtesy of the management". Then at the church summer fair he was persuaded to abseil down a tower erected by the scouts. He also took part in the Scout Gang Show where we did a double act - one in particular was "The Gas Man Cometh", with Peter in an ancient wheel chair. These instances illustrated his sense of humour and letting his hair down.

Peter was also involved in the wider church affairs and secular organisations - he was Chairman of Solihull Council of Voluntary Organisations and he established the Solihull Samaritans whose first base was in the upstairs room in the hall.

Whilst his commitment to church and the community were important facets of his life, his family, Butty, Jo and Fran, were his anchor and were of paramount importance to him.

Those of us who had the privilege of sharing some of our life with Peter are extremely grateful.

Working for Solihull Health Authority in 1980's we always dreaded the monthly visits by the four Governing teams.

However, when the 'A' team visited, made up of various dignitaries, I was always happy as this team included my favourite Governor, the Reverend Peter Roe.

As a ward manager I was used to showing the group around the services and introduce them to staff and residents. Peter was always very interested in our specialised care of both Children and Adults who had additional needs.

I never told the staff that at home we were in fact good friends and they never understood why I enjoyed the usually tedious and laborious visits.

I also have never shared that in 1972 I went into a very dark place, one that would take me many years to get over. It was at that time that Peter Roe gave me strength and courage to soldier on. Following this he with a few close friends and my parents formed the first Samaritans group in Solihull.

I will be ever grateful to Peter for the comfort he gave to me and my sisters on the passing of both our parents.

God bless you Peter, now home with your precious Butty.

As a family we were always impressed with Peter's Pastoral ministry, he had a very caring nature, if anyone was suffering or in trouble he would always be there with advice and support.

I experienced this especially when Michael died, he and Butty, even though they had moved away, were in regular contact to make sure we were coping.

It was this caring side that encouraged him, along with others, to open the first Solihull Samaritans in the upstairs clubroom.

The kettle was always on at the Vicarage and a warm welcome given to all visitors. Michael and I were regulars in the early days, as babysitters for Jo and Fran, and if we couldn't do it Mum, Dorothy would readily jump in.

Peter enjoyed her visits, especially when she used to take some of her homemade produce, the date and walnut sandwiches were a firm favourite of his!!!!!!

We will remember him with fondness, and will always remember his dry sense of humour.

So much so he gave us "mates rates" and cut his holiday short to be able to take the service. He put Rob and I well at ease when we had the pre wedding "talk", and very politely sent mum packing when she turned up at the wedding rehearsal...bobbing up from behind the already arranged flowers she was pretending to arrange. He quietly suggested she was probably more important that she be at home to finalise arrangements with the menfolk. She did what she was told bless.

He had such a soft authoritative air about him. I am honoured to have been asked to share a memory.

"Cathedral of the Month" - September

St. David's

Set on a spectacular Pembrokeshire peninsula jutting out into the Atlantic upon the site of an earlier sixth-century monastery built by St David, the patron saint of Wales, St David's Cathedral has been a site of pilgrimage and worship for more than 800 years. Today this splendid building erected to the



glory of God remains a vibrant, living church offering a place of peace for prayer and devotion.

The present cathedral was begun sometime between 1180 and 1182 and is the culmination of centuries of rebuilding and expansion. Constructed in the Transitional Norman style using fine-grained, purple Cambrian sandstone, it has survived both the collapse of its tower and an earthquake in the 13th century, although today the floor slopes noticeably, the arcades veer from the vertical, and the east and west ends of the building differ in height by about four metres! The Cathedral's foundations are still shifting, albeit minutely, but it remains a solid and lasting testament to the glory of God, enthralling and inspiring the many thousands of people who visit it each year.


St David's Cathedral as we see it today has been extended and altered over the centuries by many individuals, but its appearance was probably most influenced by Bishop Gower in the 14th century, and later, in the 19th century, by the renowned architect, Sir George Gilbert Scott, who undertook a significant restoration of the fabric of the building. In the 20th century, the ruinous St Mary's Hall was restored for use as a parish hall and in the 21st century the restoration of the cloisters has made our own very significant impact on the appearance of the Cathedral.
